Our annual meeting and workshop at the historic Holt Library in Saginaw enjoyed capacity attendance. What a wonderful venue for members coming to learn from each other about how to help keep their libraries vital to their communities. Many thanks are due the administration and staff of the Holt Library as well as our Friends hosts. We look forward to the chance to work with them again. The FOML Workshop Planning Committee has been pulling together the program for our fall meeting in Kalamazoo. I encourage everyone to register early.

In the wake of the recent primary elections we have a lot to be grateful for. With 51 of 55 millage questions passing, it demonstrates Michigan citizens support their local libraries in most communities. Our natural impulse is to examine the things that went wrong in those areas where the millage questions were unsuccessful, but let's not forget to celebrate and take note of things that went right. Of the 55 ballot questions there were 25 successful requests for a new or increased millage. Two were for new building initiatives. Of those defeated, only one was for the renewal of an existing millage losing by only a 4 vote margin.

As of this writing it is uncertain how many millage questions will be on Michigan ballots for the general election. With all of the noise the general election is certain to make we can't afford to whisper about the needs our libraries face. A well-informed electorate has never been more important than it is now.

Sightseeing Around the State

A few weeks ago, I ventured to the northwestern part of the Lower Peninsula. During my stay I asked for a tour of the Traverse Area District Library (TADL) and was delighted when Friends President, Maryln Lawrence, agreed to conduct the tour herself. Meeting me just inside the entrance Maryln led me through a beautiful library.

Plenty of natural light flooded both floors of the building with large glass panels allowing a view of the wonderful grounds. Making great use of the space outside the library proper, TADL boasts a Children's Garden where Story Walks are conducted. Pages of a child's book are featured at different points along the

path that encourage a child to read as the garden is enjoyed. At the end of the route a child will have read an entire story. It's one of the most creative uses of space I've seen in a library grounds.

Artwork, created by local artists, graces the walls throughout the interior making for a very inviting atmosphere. Study and conference rooms are plentiful and in high demand. One of the most intriguing features for me however (as I am a bit of a space cadet) is that outside the library near a bike path behind the library is a pole with a replica of our own sun at the top. It is the beginning of a six mile scale to distance, interactive model of our solar system. How fitting that the library starts it off.

The Future is (Almost) Digital

As the world moves rapidly in the production of more digital content, FOML has begun to gather together its print history into an organized collection of archival print content. While collecting print materials sounds a bit outdated for those of us living in the age of digital, most of FOML's history is in print form and the FOML Board decided that it was time to assemble all past records into one centralized location.

In 2015 an Archives Review Committee headed by FOML President, Paul Snyder, and FOML Archivist, Jim Doyle, met to determine a course of action concerning the collection of print materials for past FOML workshops, board meetings, and all other material that might have historical significance. Paul received authorization from the FOML Board to explore options for storage of these archival materials, and he was pleased to report that all FOML archival records will be stored at the Burton Historical Collection at the Detroit Public Library.

Collecting past historical materials is a time-consuming process and reviewing, sorting, and placing these materials into archival boxes requires good judgment about what to keep and what doesn't have historical value. Paul and Jim have devoted many hours to carrying out this process. We have not overlooked the importance of digital content during this process, and any FOML materials that were born-digital will be collected on a flash drive and placed in the FOML Archives as well.

You can assist in this process of collecting FOML history by letting Paul Snyder know about paper records that you might have from past FOML events and that you are willing to donate to FOML's history collection. And thanks go out to the Archives Review Committee that provided some guidelines to Paul and Jim on moving forward with this project. Committee members included Charles Hanson and Claudia Diaz.

Michigan Library Cooperative News

The eleven Cooperative Libraries in Michigan serve the needs of their member libraries across the State. At least 90% of the public libraries and a smaller percentage of school and academic libraries belong to the eleven Cooperatives. Every other month the directors of the Cooperatives meet to discuss issues related to libraries that include technology, children's services, legislation, state aid to libraries and a myriad of other topics.

This year the directors participated in a visioning session with facilitator Pan Godchaux in Gaylord. The directors looked at who the cooperatives could better serve their members and ultimately the residents of the state with exceptional service opportunities. The group reflected on past practices and successes and addressed how networking with each other would help libraries better serve their clientele.

Projects the group is working on include updating the informational brochure which explains what cooperatives provide and details the serve areas of each cooperative, establishing a website where cooperatives can post meetings, programs and other items related to library services. A committee is presently taking the information gained from the visioning session and will produce a document that can serve as a guide to understand the roles Cooperatives play in the Michigan library world.


