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Highlights from Talk About Friends at Clinton-Macomb Library

Larry Neal, Clinton-Macomb Library Director, and Marylyn Lucaora, Friends President, hosted the recent Talk About Friends event, providing insights on their library's history and Friends group structure. Fourteen attendees from seven libraries—including Flint, Novi, and Grosse Pointe—participated. Clare Membiela from the Library of Michigan shared best practices on topics like Memorandums of Understanding, 501(c)(3) regulations, and Directors and Officers insurance, earning high praise for her valuable insights.

Sue Johnson, FOML Vice President, introduced the new Consult-A-Friend mentoring program, which supports Friends groups through consultations. The event featured table discussions on membership and fundraising ideas, such as permanent Friends displays, community sponsorships, and unique fundraising events like a "Brew & Browse." Attendees later discussed defining success and overcoming challenges, emphasizing the importance of member engagement and communication. Evaluations were highly positive, with attendees appreciating the opportunity to exchange ideas and solutions. 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FOML Launches 'Consult-A-Friend' Program for Enhanced Member Support



At the October "Talk About Friends" workshop, FOML introduced Consult-A-Friend (CAF), a new program designed to provide members with personalized support. FOML President Jill Sodt described the program as a significant enhancement, offering three levels of assistance to meet diverse needs.

The Self-Service tier allows members to access tools and resources on the FOML website for quick, independent solutions. For more personalized help, the Assisted Service tier lets members submit requests for guidance, with responses provided within 48 hours.

For complex needs, the Consultative Service tier offers in-depth consultations to identify opportunities, improve efficiencies, and develop strategic plans. Board Director Joe David emphasized that this unique level of support is especially beneficial for groups seeking expert insights or fresh perspectives. "We believe CAF will be invaluable for members, whether they need business advice or simply want a new approach," he said.
